The Naperville Area Homeowners Confederation (NAHC) September meeting will focus on property taxes, how they are determined and what homeowners can do about them. With guest speakers ranging from a County Treasurer to a Township Assessor, we will look at the process for setting tax rates and apportioning the pie between property owners.

This kick-off meeting of our fall schedule will be held on Thursday evening, September 17th beginning at 7:30 PM. In addition to changing meetings to Thursday evenings from our traditional Saturday morning slot, the Confederation is also moving to a new location. Effective with the September 17th meeting, sessions will be held in the Community Room of the Alfred Rubin Riverwalk Community Center, 305 W. Jackson Avenue. The meeting program is scheduled to run from 7:30 until 9:00 PM with attendees and participants welcome to come at 7:15 PM for coffee and networking.

Other meetings we have planned for the next 10 months include those that will focus on our school districts, including the College of DuPage, and on the Naperville Park District.



Also on tap are meetings designed to educate not only our member associations, but also residents. We are planning to address municipal services, including those available in emergencies, association legal requirements, and the impacts on our members of some of the latest legislation to come out of Springfield and Washington.

Zoning and Land Use Update



The following report from Zoning & Land Use Committee chair Thom Higgins includes development projects that were discussed at the August monthly meeting with City Staff and/or were determined by Plan Commission and Council:

In attendance: Thom Higgins and Bob Fischer for the NAHC, Greg Jones and Suzanne Thorsen for the City of Naperville

New Proposals:

Water Street Development: The developers will appear in front of City Council requesting that the PUD approval, granted two years ago be renewed for another two years. Construction has been postponed due to market conditions.

Eganhouse Condo Towers 445 Aurora Ave: The proposal will be presented to the Plan Commission on October 7th. The developer is asking for the property to be re-zoned OCI (with a conditional use for residential), as well as variances for height, FAR (floor area ratio) and density. The twin 86' tall condo buildings would sit on the parcel between the River Bend condo's and Rotary Hill. These are luxury condos with one unit per floor, for a total of 14 units, with parking on the first floor. In addition, due to fire department regulations, they need to provide two access points. As the parcel is narrow they are requesting that the second access point be made through the Rotary Hill parking lot. The issue of allowing a private party to have access through a public parking lot was raised with the Riverwalk Commission as well as the Park District. Neither were comfortable with this concept.

Ellsworth Condo's: The developer is requesting consideration be tabled until the Fifth Avenue Study is concluded. Current plans are for a 30 unit, floor story condo complex, on Ellsworth, facing Burlington Square Park, from 4th to North. They are asking for the parcel to be re-zoned from primarily R-2 (one small parcel is B3) to OCI (with a conditional use for residential) as well as a front yard set back variance (from 20' to 6') a corner yard variance (20' to 15") and a density variance.

Cell Tower: Plan Commission voted against approving the variances needed for construction of a telecommunications cell tower at 2191 Plainfield-Naperville Road (adjacent to Fire Station 5) in Naperville, near Springbrook Prairie Forest Preserve. Commissioners Bill Jepson, Reynold Sterlin and John Herzog supported the plan.

CVS Pharmacy: A proposal to replace the Ogden Mall Pizza Hut Restaurant at Naperville Rd. and Ogden Ave. with a CVS Pharmacy was approved by the Plan Commission on August 18th and will be in front of City Council in October. CVS is planning on starting construction soon thereafter and hopes to work through the winter.

659 S. Washington: Shell will be renovating and re-opening this property in the coming months.

Ongoing Proposals:

Omnia Performing Arts Center: At their August 18th meeting, after 2 hours consideration, City Council accepted Staff's recommendation and unanimously rejected the Omnia proposal (Jim Boyajian absent). Council members mentioned the potential financial risk to the city due to the TIF bonding, as well as concerns about height, density, and traffic as their reasons for denying Omnia. In the days leading up to the meeting Omnia representatives asked for consideration be tabled, citing that they felt there was a lack of information and understanding of the project. That request was denied, but Councilman Miller did talk at length offering his view that Council didn't really need to vote on Omnia's proposal. In the end, Councilman Furstenau made the motion to reject the concept, Wehrli seconded it, and it was rejected 8-0.

A number of Council members talked about Omnia having the right to respond to the traditional RFP (request for proposal) process, if and when the city executes one for the various city owned properties along Fifth Ave.

Omnia had proposed constructing a performing arts center with three theaters. A 2700 seat, a 950 seat and a 200 seat theater on what is currently the Metra commuter parking lot at Fifth and Washington. As part of the project they proposed an expanded parking garage to be shared with commuters. The \$190-200 million project would be financed by a \$130 million TIF and also funded by the sale of 600-650 condo and town homes and \$70 million in proceeds from land sales of properties currently owned by Metra and the City.

Turning Pointe: At their third appearance in front of the Plan Commission on August 5th. Turning Pointe was approved 5 to 2 with Ann Edmonds and Patty Gustin voting against. Ms. Edmonds was unhappy with Turning Pointe's land use and the length of the structure sitting 25' off the rear property line. Ms. Gustin wanted to see the parking lot in the rear of the property rather than the front. City Council will consider the preliminary plans, plat and PUD at their September 15th meeting.

BP gas station: 95th and Book will begin construction this fall, replacing the existing building with a larger AM/PM convenience store.

Studies and Initiatives:

Fifth Avenue Study: At the August 18th meeting City Council tabled consideration of the study after hearing public testimony from the public. It was decided to hold a Council Workshop on October 12th. The workshop will begin at 5 p.m. in Meeting Rooms A, B and C of the Naperville Municipal Center, 400 S. Eagle Street. Council workshops are an opportunity for City Council members to analyze

issues and exchange ideas on a given topic that requires in-depth discussion. The public is invited to attend the workshop; however, public testimony will not be accepted. Following the workshop, the 5th Avenue Study will be scheduled for a City Council meeting. .

Plank Rd. Study: Naperville will kick off the Plank Rd. Study to evaluate future land uses of specific parcels along Plank Rd. from Columbia to Naper Blvd at a September 22nd meeting . For more information go to: <http://www.naperville.il.us/plankroadstudy.aspx>

Central Park Master Plan: The Park District Board elected not to vote on the plan at their August meeting due to their concerns regarding where financial and maintenance responsibilities would lie between the District and the city. The feeling was that approval of the plan will be contingent upon a successful execution of an intergovernmental agreement between the City and the Park District. That agreement would outline which entity is responsible for various areas of the park. An RFP for new seating has been issued, and the expectation is the seating area will be under construction beginning next spring and continuing into the 2010 summer as the terraced the seating area is built.

Legislative Update - Community Association Manager Act

On August 25th, Governor Quinn signed into law Public Act 96-0726, The Community Association Manager Act. It was the intent of the General Assembly that this Act provide for the regulation of managers of community associations, ensuring that those who hold themselves out as possessing professional qualifications to engage in the provision of community association management services are, in fact, qualified to render management services of a professional nature, and provide for the maintenance of high standards of professional conduct by those licensed as community association managers.



Effective January 1, 2011, no person may provide services as a Community Association Manager unless he or she holds a current and valid manager license. Like other licensing statutes, the Community Association Manager Act will create minimum qualifications for licensure, provide financial security to associations, impose discipline for manager misconduct and require continuing education to renew the license.

Recognizing existing service and experience, the Act also provides that persons who have been working in the Community Association management field for five (5) years will be exempt from the initial license requirement to pass an examination. The Act also recognizes continuing education credits for those persons who take courses to maintain their professional real estate license.

Further details will be forthcoming from the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Currently there are no details on the department website.

Additionally, Public Act 96-0228 was signed into law on August 11, 2009, The Act provides that a condominium association cannot exercise a right of first refusal or an option to purchase a unit because the purchaser's financing is guaranteed by the Federal Housing Authority.

In the same vein, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development issued its Mortgage Letter 2009-19. This Letter also revised government policy on the right of first refusal. The new HUD Policy is that a right of first refusal is permitted unless it violates discriminatory conduct under the Fair Housing Act. The Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing on the basis of certain protected classifications such as race, color, religion, sex, familial status, national origin or handicap.

Route 59 Expansion



For the past six years the City of Naperville, in partnership with the Illinois Department of Transportation, has conducted extensive analysis to address traffic congestion and safety along Route 59 between Ferry Road and Aurora Avenue. High traffic volumes and resulting travel delays and accidents have a negative impact on the quality of life of area residents who use this three mile segment of Rte 59 every day for trips to work, school, public transportation, shopping and dining.

Naperville and IDOT have identified key improvements for this segment of roadway including widening for a third through lane in each direction and adding turn lanes at intersections. The proposed improvement plan is the culmination of six years of working with the businesses, residents, and property owners. The City and IDOT are looking forward to presenting the proposed improvement plan to the Public at an open house on Thursday, September 17th, from 4:30 PM until 7:00 PM at Thayer J. Hill Middle School, 1836 Brookdale Road. All interested homeowners and residents are welcome to attend

NAHC Briefs – News You Can Use!

The Conservation Foundation will host the first stakeholders meeting for the **Lower DuPage River watershed group** on **Thursday, September 10th** from **10 a.m. to noon** at the Plainfield Public Works Facility, 14400 Coil Plus Drive in Plainfield. The meeting is open to the public, all interested parties are welcome to attend.

The ultimate goal of the Lower DuPage Watershed Group is to create and implement a watershed-based plan that would incorporate the recommended practices identified in the forthcoming TMDLs (Total Maximum Daily Loads) and eliminate impairments in the Lower DuPage River Watershed. This plan could influence policy in the currently undeveloped areas of the watershed and create opportunities to protect and enhance water quality.

A team will be formed to assist in the watershed planning and implementation of the TMDLs as well as be invested in ongoing collaborative efforts in the watershed. Communities within the Lower DuPage Watershed include Bolingbrook, Channahon, Joliet, Minooka, Naperville, Plainfield, Romeoville, and Shorewood. Naperville has earned "Safe Community" status from the **National Fire Protection Association's (NFPA) Safe Community Program**. To earn this designation, a community must be using one of NFPA's educational programs, host a community-wide event each year that focuses on the NFPA educational program being utilized and complete and submit an application.



The City of Naperville utilizes two of NFPA's programs: Learn Not to Burn® and Remembering When™. Learn Not to Burn® is a six-month program taught in every third grade classroom in Naperville School District 203. Through this program, children learn about fire safety and first aid. Originally started as a pilot program in 2002 with Beebe Elementary School and River Woods Elementary School, this program has expanded to all elementary schools in the district.

Remembering When™ is a fire and fall prevention program for older adults that was developed by the NFPA and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to help older adults live safely at home for as long as possible. The city's program, which is derived from Remembering When™, is calling SHIP (Senior Home Inspection Program). As part of the program, representatives from Naperville's Fire and Police Departments will perform a comprehensive safety inspection of older adults' homes. These checks look for fire and fall hazards as well as possible security issues.

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The City of Naperville is updating its **Downtown Plan** through the year 2030. The public is invited to participate in the Downtown Plan update by completing the city's Downtown Naperville 2030 Vision Worksheet by Thursday, October 1. Interested parties may download the worksheet from the city's Web site at www.naperville.il.us/napervilledowntown2030.aspx.

The Downtown Vision Worksheet was a component of the Downtown Naperville 2030 public workshops held on Thursday, July 23 and Friday, July 24. Those in attendance at either workshop do not need to resubmit the visioning worksheet. However, people who were unable to attend one of the workshops have an opportunity to participate by completing the visioning worksheet.



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The **DuPage River Trail** was closed between Pioneer Park and Hobson Road beginning Friday, August 28, 2009. This portion of the trail is slated to re-open in early November. The trail closure is required to complete construction activities related to the 75th and Washington Intersection Improvement Project.

Trail users are advised to follow the posted detour route through the neighborhoods east of the DuPage River. A map of the detour route is available on the city's Web site at www.naperville.il.us/75andwashimprovements.aspx.

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The City is seeking public input on different **environmental policies** it may incorporate into its environmental sustainability plan. Residents and interested parties can visit www.naperville.il.us/envirosustain.aspx to participate in a survey to evaluate and rank different environmental policies.

As part of the city's fiscal year 2009-2010 Strategic Plan Initiatives, City Council included a goal to develop an overall plan for environmental sustainability in the City of Naperville. Information collected from the survey will be used to identify priorities as specific actions and programs are developed for the Council's consideration. Residents and interested parties may participate in the survey through Tuesday, September 15.

The survey consists of five categories: leadership and education, resources and energy, transportation and mobility, waste management and recycling, and sustainable development and infrastructure. Within each category, there are nine policies listed which would strengthen environmental sustainability in the city. Survey participants will be asked to rank each policy by category in order of importance to them. There is also space for survey participants to add a policy within each category.

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The new covered **bicycle shelter** at the downtown Naperville train station opened to commuters on Monday, August 24, 2009. The new shelter, located on the east side of the north platform, added approximately 52 new bicycle parking spaces to the existing 155 spaces.



In addition to the new covered bicycle shelter, the City of Naperville, in partnership with the DuPage Children's Museum, recently installed new bicycle racks at the northeast corner of the DuPage Children's Museum property, south of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad tracks. These new racks will accommodate 22 bicycles.

A covered bicycle shelter is also being built at the Route 59 train station. This shelter is slated to open in late September following completion of the Route 59 station improvements that are currently underway. When completed, this shelter will add roughly 46 new bicycle parking spaces to the existing 67 spaces.

The City of Naperville built the bicycle shelters in response to commuter requests for additional bicycle parking at both of the city's Metra stations. Based on a 2008 commuter survey, covered bicycle parking spaces are most preferred by commuters. The shelters are being partially funded through a West Suburban Mass Transit District grant. Public Safety Month will have its official kick-off on Saturday, October 3rd from 11:00-3:00 during the "Public Safety Open House" held on Naperville's Public Safety Campus located on Aurora Avenue. This must-see event will include a variety of activities including auto extrication, a flashover fire demonstration, and fire extinguisher training for the whole family. A large display of vehicles and equipment will also be available, including the Lifestar-Chicago Helicopter exercise at 1:30 pm. One of the activities specifically for children includes a hands-on Firefighter Combat Challenge in which participants have the opportunity to squirt a real fire hose.

Recycling Options

Beyond curbside recycling, the City of Naperville also provides a “drop-off” recycling center. The city’s recycling drop-off center is housed within the Multi-Purpose Public Works Center, located at 180 Fort Hill Dr. Materials are accepted on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Materials accepted at the drop-off center



include:

- Newspapers
- Advertisements
- Junk mail
- Magazines
- Catalogs
- Phone books
- Books (notebooks, novels, hard or soft textbooks)
- Office paper

- Post-It Notes™
- Gift wrap
- Paper bags
- Chipboard boxes such as gift boxes, tissue boxes and cereal boxes
- Corrugated cardboard boxes, including frozen food boxes
- Glass bottles and jars
- Aluminum cans, foil and trays
- Tin or steel cans, including empty aerosol cans and paint cans
- Plastic containers numbered No. 1 through No. 7, with the exception of those labeled No. 6
- Plastic six-pack rings
- Milk cartons and drink boxes
- Cast iron
- Aluminum or steel scrap pieces
- Metal drain spouts
- Metal siding
- Metal fencing
- Metal pipes
- Metal fixtures
- Metal hangers

The recycling drop-off center is free, and an attendant is on site to help residents and answer any questions. Appliances are not accepted at the drop-off center. If you have any questions regarding recyclable materials, call (630) 420-6095 or visit www.naperville.il.us/recyclecenter.aspx.

Household hazardous waste is not accepted at the recycling drop-off facility. Residents looking to dispose of items such as oil-based paint, pesticides and automotive fluids must utilize the Household Hazardous Waste drop-off, located behind Fire Station No. 4, 1971 Brookdale Road. Conservation Foundation's Headquarters a Safe Haven for Monarch Butterflies

The Conservation Foundation is proud to announce that their headquarters at McDonald Farm in Naperville has recently been recognized as a certified Monarch Waystation through the monarch butterfly conservation group, Monarch Watch.

To gain Monarch Waystation certification from Monarch Watch their land had to meet certain criteria. These criteria included having an appropriate amount of milkweed, which provides a breeding ground for the butterflies, and enough flowers to provide the nectar that fuels the Monarch's migration patterns. The path of a Monarch's migration can take it as far north as Canada during spring and summer months and then back down to Southern California and Mexico during the winter. The Conservation Foundation's gardens are filled with native plant species that provide the perfect setting for Monarchs to breed and rest up for their journeys to the north and south.



The Conservation Foundation's Conservation@Home program provides tips on how to attract Monarch's to your garden and can help those interested navigate the process of getting their own garden certified as a Monarch Waystation. Nike Sports Complex Expansion

The Park District is notifying residents that groundwork will soon begin on the planned 20-acre expansion of Nike Sports Complex, located on the north side of town bounded by Mill Street, and Diehl and Bauer Roads. Signage has been posted onsite and a public meeting on the expansion’s progress is scheduled from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 16, 2009, at the Barn Recreation Center, 421 W. Martin Ave.

The expansion is based on resident feedback, as well as recommendations contained in the Park District’s Open Space and Recreation Master Plan. Groundwork involves clearing the site to make way for recreational amenities that will include the District’s first premier lighted artificial and multi-use turf fields for soccer, football, lacrosse, cricket and more. The expanded Nike Sports Complex will be used for Park District programs, by residents, community youth and local athletic organizations.

One of the first steps is to remove trees and underbrush from the site. This is being completed through responsible planning and in consultation with certified arborists, engineering consultants and landscape architects, all experts about the native trees of Illinois. These resources are helping the Park District make informed decisions about trees on the property. Trees located along the perimeter and the existing ball field will be preserved while others, some in either fair or poor condition, will be removed. Additionally, new trees will be installed throughout the site as part of the project.

With little open public land available, the community is desperate for recreational field space on the north side of town. Land adjacent to the existing Nike Sports Complex was purchased for expansion because of its size, location and proximity. It is easily accessible and is contiguous with the existing sports complex. In addition to expanded turf fields, the complex will include courts for tennis, basketball and volleyball, as well as a playground and walking and bicycle trails. To support the maintenance of the site and its users, the expansion will also include a small support building. Groundbreaking for the expanded complex is expected in 2010-2011.

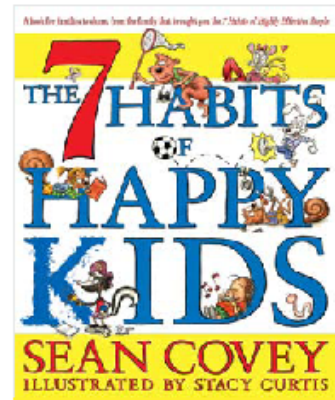

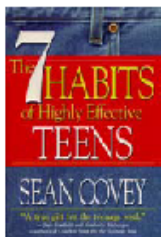

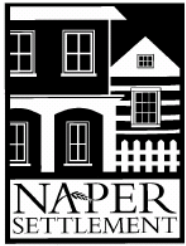
