## **Upcoming Confederation Meetings**

The Naperville Area Homeowners Confederation's next general membership meeting will be May 21<sup>st</sup>, 2011, in lower level meeting rooms B&C of the Naperville Municipal Center. We will have coffee and networking beginning at 8 and the formal meeting kicking off at 8:30. Our goal is to complete the meeting by 10 o'clock so everyone can get on with their day.

The May meeting is our annual meeting. During the meeting we will hold elections for President, Vice President, and two at large director positions. We will also spend time recapping the Confederation's prior year which included election forums, the EAB town meeting, 10 general meetings, and position statements on various local issues.

## **Zoning and Land Use Update**



This report from Thom Higgins, the chair of the Confederation Zoning & Land Use Committee, includes development and land use projects discussed at monthly NAHC meetings with City Staff, of interest to Naperville area residents, and/or under consideration by Plan Commission and Council. It also includes information obtained from other sources.

#### **New Proposals:**

**Full service hotel & Alzheimer's care facility, Freedom Plaza near Rt. 88:** Developer CRL has been working with staff to refine their proposal for a 150 room hotel with an attached conference center (large enough to qualify under the city code as a full service hotel). The hotel will share the property with a 4 story full service Alzheimer's resident treatment facility. The proposal is expected to appear in front of the Planning & Zoning Commission in May or June.

#### **Ongoing Proposals:**

**Primrose School:** Will be before the City Council on 5-3-11, looking for final approval to construct a day-care pre-school south of the Theater at Naperville Crossing on Rt 59.

**Kiddie Academy:** Received approval from the City Council on 4-5-11 to construct a daycare facility at Rt. 59 and 95<sup>th</sup>. Construction is slated to start in 30-60 days.

#### Studies and Initiatives:

**Naperville Downtown2030 plan:** Was approved by City Council on April 6<sup>th</sup>. There was extensive discussion regarding the height of various parcels in the Special Study Area (Washington to Webster, Benton to Douglas). Ultimately, Council voted to approve the plan reducing the

height along Washington from the initially proposed 60' to 43' which corresponds to the height limit for other properties along Washington from Douglas to Ogden. The properties along both sides of Main, from Benton to Franklin, had their height set at 57'. Additionally, properties along Franklin and Douglas had their height limits established at 47', down from a proposed 50', although some properties have a 47' limit and others have a 40-47' range.

Councilman Hinterlong argued for a slight height reduction for the properties along Webster, between Benton and Franklin, namely reducing the 40-50' height to 40-47' height for consistency. Additionally, he did not support the 57' ht. limit on the west side Main from Benton to Douglas preferring 50' as had

been suggested at a previous Council meeting. Councilman Fieseler concurred, but there was no other support for the motion. Both Councilmen voted against the plan which passed 7-2.

City of Naperville Planning Services Team planning workload for FY2011-2012. With the elimination of a Community Planner position, the decision was made to reduce long range planning activity by 50% compared to previous years, resulting in the following proposal:

- Focus planning efforts on the implementation of action items resulting from recently adopted plans namely, *Naperville Downtown2030*, Attainable Housing, Greener Business Program and other Strategic Plan Initiatives.
- Evaluate "quick fixes" which can be used to achieve the most critical recommendations of other studies without undertaking new studies or major zoning amendments.
- Eliminate new studies and major zoning amendments, including the Tollway Corridor Study; Mill & Bauer Small Area Study; Mixed Use Text Amendment (resulting from the *5th Avenue Study*); and Single-Family Residential Tree Preservation Requirements.

At the April 20<sup>th</sup> Plan Commission meeting the workload plan was discussed extensively, with a great deal of time spent on the Single-Family Tree Preservation Requirements. Per staff, existing tree data has been collected but there has been no analysis of it. Staff feels that drafting a text amendment will take considerable amount of their time as such a significant change in property owners rights would result in a large outpouring of public interest/comment. Currently, the city forester actively reviews permits and encourages property owners to preserve trees, but there is no requirement to preserve/replace trees. Staff indicated when property owners request annexation to the City; the City can require tree preservation as part of the annexation agreement. In the end, Commissioners voted unanimously to add the Residential Tree Preservation Text Amendment back into the workload. While Staff repeatedly requested an item be dropped if the Tree Preservation Ordinance was to be added, the Commissioners did not remove a compensating work item.

In other matters, Staff indicated their desire to institute a 43' height overlay in lieu of going forward with the previously planned Mixed Use Text Amendment for applicable properties in the 5<sup>th</sup> Ave. Study area (essentially Washington from Douglas to Ogden and 5<sup>th</sup> Ave. from Washington to Columbia). This would have had the effect of putting a hard limit on height where previously only the FAR calculation was the limiting factor for some properties.

Staff expects to hold public workshops regarding proposed B4-B5 and TU (Transitional Use) zoning amendments as part of the DT2030 implementation plan before going to Council for final approval of these amendments.

## **Emerald Ash Borer**

Our April 4<sup>th</sup> town meeting on how communities and homeowners should deal with the scourge of the Emerald Ash Borer was presented to well over 100 people in the City Council Chambers.




With over 25% of Naperville's trees at risk, the ecological and economic devastation from this infestation has the potential to be significant. Based on current reports, the assumption can be made that the Ash Borer is present citywide.

Early on, conventional wisdom was that infected ash trees had to be removed and destroyed, while healthy trees were merely awaiting an eventual death sentence. As is so often the case with "conventional wisdom," this approach is wrong, and, in fact, counter-productive. Research and actual field experience have proven that there is a way to treat this imported pest and maintain both the appearance and economic viability of our properties. Treatment, not wholesale destruction of trees in our parkways and yards is the answer.

The Confederation panel, including Naperville City Arborist, Jack Mitz; Dr Fredric Miller from Joliet Junior College and the Morton Arboretum; Dr Joe Chamberlin from Atlanta, GA; and Skeet the Arborist from the Care of Trees explained the problem and offered up solutions. With the cost of tree removal and replacement estimated at between \$500 and \$1000, the advice regarding products on the market, and how homeowners and municipalities can band together to save our urban forest was very valuable.

Since the meeting, we have been approached by other municipalities and tree care professionals regarding the information we shared. We have been told that the NAHC was one of the first community organizations to recognize the critical need to inform residents of the facts about EAB and what they can do about it.

Thanks for the accolades, but we see this as just another example of neighbors reaching out to help neighbors!

Our April meeting was the one time this year we focused on City Council. Listening to our members, and the Council, we cut back this year to a single meeting for Council, and what a great one we had! With newly elected councilmen Steve Chirico and Joe McElroy joining the mayor and all but two of the current councilmen, we had a great discussion around issues that will impact our community in the months ahead. City Manager Doug Krieger spent part of his birthday with us and provided an update on what we can expect moving forward as the City prepares for representation by district beginning in 2015. Department heads were also in attendance. providina insights and answering resident questions before, during, and after the meeting.

The Confederation would like to thank our City leadership for spending a Saturday morning with us, and we offer our sincere hopes that it was as good for them as it was for us.

## NAHC Briefs - News You Can Use!

The Naperville Police Department now offers an online reporting service to citizens wishing to file an

official police report. Online reporting will allow citizens to file a police report for non-emergency incidents at any hour, day or night. The intent of this new online reporting service is to enhance the public's ability to interact with the Naperville Police Department and free up patrol officers for emergency calls.

The Department is accepting the following types of electronic reports: civil matter of record, criminal damage to property under \$300, dumping/littering, lost property, nuisance complaint and theft of property under \$300.

online reports will be submitted to a police officer for review within five days. Citizens filing an online report will receive an e-mail confirming acceptance of the report and a unique report number.

Starting May 1, 2011, the City of Naperville will begin hosting a one-year electronics recycling pilot

program at the Public Works Service Center Recycling Drop-Off Center, 180 Fort Hill Drive. Residents can drop-off their unwanted electronics on Tuesdays and Thursdays during normal operating hours at the drop-off center of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. This program is anticipation of a new state law prohibiting deposit of electronics in landfills beginning January 1.

To deal with anticipated demand for this service, the city requests residents living north of 75<sup>th</sup> Street to bring their electronics to the facility on Tuesdays and those living south of 75<sup>th</sup> Street to bring their electronics on Thursdays. This program is an excellent opportunity to dispose of electronics in an environmentally friendly manner and replaces the one-day annual electronics recycling event the city has hosted since 2007.



Accepted items include personal computers, laptops, all-in-ones, monitors, televisions, large peripherals, copiers, computer cables, keyboards, mice, fax machines, VCR and DVD players and video game consoles. To protect electronic components that may be repurposed, at the end of each day of operation, all collected electronics will be transported to a secure location within the Public Works Service Center until Creative Recycling Systems is called for collection. Upon collection, all items become the property of Creative Recycling Systems. The City of Naperville is not responsible for items after they have been dropped off.

Please note that residents should take steps to clean computer hard drives prior to bringing the item to this recycling program. The City of Naperville assumes no responsibility to protect any electronic data remaining in electronics deposited in the electronic recycling programs. Creative Recycling Systems will also take steps to maintain data security. Dan Nelson, the City of Aurora's former Assistant Coordinator for Emergency Management, has been selected as the city's new Emergency Management Coordinator. Nelson began his employment with the city on April 11 and brings with him 12 years of experience in emergency management, including developing, coordinating and implementing emergency operations plans.

Nelson has also served as a Firefighter/EMT and Emergency Management Advisor for the North Aurora Fire Protection District and the Village of North Aurora. Nelson has a bachelor's degree in Environmental Health from Illinois State University and has experience with the Southern Kane County Training Association and



the American Red Cross AmeriCorps USA. He also has served as a member of the Illinois Terrorism

Taskforce (ITTF), ITTF Emergency Management Subcommittee, ITTF Emergency Management Grant Review and Administration Committee, International Association of Emergency Management and the Illinois Emergency Services Management Association.

## **New Federal Swimming Pool Regulations**

In November the U.S. Department of Justice published updated ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) design standards related to recreational facilities, including subdivision pools and spas. These swimming pool accessibility requirements must be in place for all existing and new public pools on or before March 12, 2012.

These new standards state that accessible means of entry/exit are required for swimming pools. Such accessible means of entry include a pool lift or sloped entry, and either a transfer wall, transfer system, or pool stairs. Wading pools must provide a sloped entry, and spas must provide a pool lift, transfer wall, or transfer system. Wave action pools, leisure rivers, and sand bottom pools where user access is limited to one area shall not be required to provide more than one accessible means of entry, either a pool lift, sloped entry, or a transfer system.

Depending on the size of your association pool, differing regulations apply. Reviewing websites, the bulk of the information available seems to be from companies offering solutions to the issues established by these new regulations, and since these are government regulations, attorneys may also be a good source. Here are some tips on how to be a good listener for your kids.

- Set time aside each day, even a few minutes, to focus completely on your children.
   Let them take the lead on what you do, whether it's snuggle, talk, play or something else.
- Use "active listening" with your children: Ask good questions, paraphrases what they say to make sure you understand, and show that you empathize with what they are saying.
- Practice "hearing" on more than one level. Listen to the words kids are saying and tune in to the tone of their voice and body language.
- Spend time with your teenagers on a regular basis doing things you both enjoy. Often teenagers will prefer talking while doing some other activity over sitting down and having face-to-face conversations with their parents.

## **Coming In May – NAHC Elections**



In accordance with our bylaws, the Naperville Area Homeowners Confederation will hold elections at the Confederation Annual Meeting, scheduled for Saturday, May 21, 2011 at 8:30 AM in meeting rooms B&C of the Naperville Municipal Center, 400 S. Eagle Street, Naperville, Illinois. The offices to be voted on are President of the Confederation (currently Dr. Bob Buckman); Vice President (currently Bob Fischer); and two at large Director Positions (currently held by Allen

Panek and Rick Strawbridge). While all incumbents are eligible to run again for their current positions, Mr. Strawbridge has indicated he will not seek re-election.

A nominating committee, Chaired by Confederation Secretary John Mesarchik, was formed at the March 19<sup>th</sup> General Meeting to prepare a slate of recommended candidates. These were announced at the April General Meeting and include:

President: Dr. Bob Buckman Vice President: Bob Fischer

At Large Directors: Allen Panek and Marcia Straub

Nominations will also be accepted from the floor the day of the meeting. Any person who, at the time of the election, is a member of a homeowners association which is a Confederation member in good standing may seek and hold office on the Confederation Board of Directors; except that there shall be no more than one Confederation Officer or a total of two Confederation Board of Directors members from any one Confederation member association.

Duties of the positions to be elected are as follows:

**President** – shall be the chief executive officer of the Confederation; shall preside at all meetings; shall be the chairperson of the Confederation Board of Directors; and shall be the custodian of the corporate records and seal. All records of Confederation business shall be and remain the property of the Confederation, including but not limited to electronically-stored records. The President shall also

ensure (and may delegate to other Board Members the direct responsibility to see) that all newsletters, notices to member associations, and other Confederation communications, are promptly sent and distributed in a timely and appropriate manner and shall ensure that the Secretary is provided, in a timely and appropriate manner, copies or other adequate information on all such communications.

Vice President – shall assume all duties of the President in the event the office of President becomes vacant for any reason, and shall perform such other duties as assigned by the President of the Confederation Board of Directors.

At-Large Board Members - shall be chairpersons of Ad Hoc Committees of the Confederation as formed at the discretion of the BOD. They shall be eligible to assume the terms and duties of Confederation officers, if such officers resign, refuse, become ineligible, or are otherwise unavailable to fulfill their terms. At-Large Board Members shall be empowered to vote in all decisions of the BOD. If any elected Director is not able for any reason to complete a term of office, the BOD may appoint an Associate Director to serve as a Director until the next annual election and any individual so appointed shall be empowered to serve and perform their duties upon appointment.

All member associations in good standing are eligible to cast a vote in this election. To be considered in good standing, member associations are to be current in their annual dues.
