Group 1 Post-it Notes - Issues and Concerns

- Density - How much can we fit in there
- Some changes discussed will result in extremely drastic and unnecessary lay-out designs for the area involved.
- Changing age-makeup of residents, i.e., demographics, needs to be considered.
- Too much emphasis being discussed on location for ribfest, etc., a once-a-year event.
- Why do we only think of this location as our "festival place".
- Flooding if paved over.
- Bright lights, noise
- Limit heights of buildings anywhere
- The City has lost sight of what Naperville has been (quaint small town with unique feel) and is changing to a large development. The community and feel of Naperville is being destroyed.
- Too much development concentrated in and around downtown.
- That Naperville Central High School remains a top-quality high school.
- Future of District 203 and Naperville Central High School - rebuild or renovate.
- Is the cemetery big enough for at least 50 more years.
- Magnet schools to concentrate on the Arts.
- This opportunity for change not be lost.
- All plans are big and long range.
- Create a use/uses for the Caroline Martin-Mitchell property that will last for 50 - 75 years,.
- Public land is used for community good.
- Planners and officials will be too confined by what exists already to think of perhaps better uses.
- There is insufficient playing field space, i.e., ball fields especially.
- Lack of public participation where it really counts - locally.
- City Council and staff not proactive in going to citizens to get input. Waits at public hearings.
- Where are the younger citizens?
- Lots of open space, natural land, mature native trees.
- Keep the Sportsman's gun shooting club.

Group 2 Post-it Notes - Issues and Concerns

- Lack of long-term vision.
 - We are being Chicago tall buildings.
 - What are the community needs? Education, recreation, transportation, wellness, internment, government, commerce, etc.?
 - Traffic is a very big concern.
 - I am concerned that the entire Caroline Martin Mitchell property is not available to all Naperville citizens. Caroline's will specifically stated that her property be "perpetually devoted to public use" with special attention to portray and preserve historical background.
 - Do not want plans to adversely affect nearby residents or neighborhoods.
 - Balanced development following a master plan with concern to commercial, multi-family housing, and size of projects of both.
 - City doesn't have a consistent vision of what it wants to be.
 - Sector G - South side of Naperville and pulling them in.
 - Development downtown - losing Mom and Pop businesses.
 - Teardowns or preservation of buildings.
 - Move garden plots to less premium property.
 - Move Gun Club from center of town.
 - The community needs to have input as to how they envision cooperation between the School Board and Park District.
 - Get all intergovernmental groups to cooperate for the betterment of Naperville . Be flexible.
- Future hopes for all children and adults. Educational opportunities for learning how to conserve all of our natural resources (sunlight and earth) for use by future generations both biologic and technical through metabolism. Reference is Cradle to Cradle by McDonough and Braungart
- Finding balance downtown Naperville and throughout the City.
 - Concerns no further input will be coordinated after we've figured out this exercise.
 - Status quo is my hope.
 - It seems that either renovation of a new high school will require participation by all parties for success.
 - That Central High School gets a good site that will serve its needs for 20+ years.
 - Providing an improved education environment for the future children of Naperville.

Closing Comments From Index Cards

- I was surprised at the number of people who came and at how well the process worked. Even the loudest voices got only one vote. A far better method for public input than "Comments from the public".
 - Greater Communication and Involvement of citizens is needed in this process (decision making of land use). Green space is very important. Watching developers self-interest.
 - This will take a lot of discussion and compromise to reach a conclusion.
 - The future of Naperville.
 - Gratified to see this many people turn out on an early Saturday morning - Sorry not to see more people under the age of 50.
 - Good democratic process. Sportsman's, VonOven (Scouts) and Cemetery Association not community-minded.
 - Property use should be determined not based on what it has been for 100 years, but what it should be in 100 years.
 - People are concerned on two major points. The don't feel enough involvement in the process of future improvements. They are not afraid of change, but want the future to include past uses, green space, kids, safety, etc.
 - I did not feel anything new or different surfaced during the discussions. I felt very similar issues and points have been identified and discussed by the stakeholders who began the process, thus representing the community's diverse thoughts.
 - I'm pleased to know that preserving open space is a priority with so many participants. I'm disappointed that very little attention was paid to a 27 acres used by a PRIVATE gun club.
 - What brought me here today? Hope of maintaining present uses of land which have something for everyone. Time well-spent if nothing changed.
 - AHA - That often residents aren't aware of big topics until after they find out the plans' and proposals' facts, when they have already formed pre-conceived ill-informed opinions. The Chicagoization of Naperville.
 - As a one-time activity it was good. If covered well in media and newsletters, then a once-a-year process will generate bigger turnout.
 - People value open space. People are concerned about transportation.
 - Large degree of support for preserving green space and natural areas.
 - I am happy to see the majority of people gathered today are in favor of keeping open and natural space. Also we need to preserve and make the best use of current structures at the high school. There has been a lot of waste of solid structures going into landfills and being replaced by absurdly large homes that waste an enormous amount of our natural resources to run. We need to give our children a good education in many aspects, one of which is how to conserve and make wise environmental choices. Encourage everyone to use mass transportation, bicycles, etc., then we won't need as much parking space.
 - It was nice to get the ball rolling on this issue. But, it's way too soon to act upon until the school decides its opportunities or direction they'll be going in.
 - Disappointed that there wasn't a bigger turnout. All groups seemed to want the same things, open space - keep thing the way they are.
 - The concept of a civic campus that maintains open space, promotes education, physical fitness, and multigenerational uses while helping solve transportation/mobility is possible.
 - Well done meeting. Thanks to League of Women Voters. Concern not mentioned - the taxes and expense of all these "dream" ideas. Far-out to say the least. Everything for the kids is getting tiresome in Naperville. Too much concern on the festivals and fests.
 - Greatest take-away. The need to embrace the past/historical values that were and are embedded in the community. Do NOT create a future community without that foundation.
 - Take-aways. How important the process of deciding best use was said to be, but very few if any, under 30's were involved today. Ho strong the "status quo" option was expressed.
 - Many people desire to have the existing land uses remain the same. Also, the affordability issues are important. There is a dichotomy in the responses though, with some seemingly not considering this at all.
 - It surprised me how hard it seems to be to express possibilities (Hope and Ideas). Easy to express concerns and say "Don't change". Teach us how to dream positively, transparently, and with joy.
 - Better use of existing space. There is nothing progressive about the words "status quo".
 - Very little mention of renewable energy and sustainable buildings. By renewable I mean Solar, Wind and Geothermal. There needs to be more vision concerning use of diminishing resources.
- I would love to see a NEW Naperville Central High School building - A Green center of education using renewable energy and building products. I have no problem with reconfiguring the Caroline Martin-Mitchell property. PS - no one mentioned the lead at the Sportsman Park gun club.
- I'm glad to see that there is a shared hope for preservation of natural open space within Naperville. Let's not waste this opportunity. Naperville is a true gem partly because of the park space we have presently.
